Evaluating for Credibility

Currency: Is it up to date?

When was the information published or posted? When was it last updated?

Authority: Is it reliable and trustworthy?

Who is the author/creator? What are their credentials? Who is the publisher or sponsor?

Relevance/Reliability: What/who is the source of the information?

Does the information relate to your topic or help answer your question? Does the author provide references or sources?

Purpose: What is the reason this information is available?

What is the information meant to do?

Inform, teach, sell, entertain, persuade?

Is the information fact or opinion? Propaganda?

Does the point of view seem to be objective and impartial or is it biased?

 Political, ideological, cultural, religious, institutional, personal?
 Websites – what does the URL and/or domain tell you?

Examples: .com – commercial; .gov – government; .org – organization (but what kind of organization are they?)

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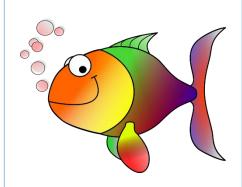
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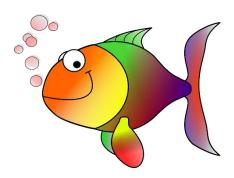
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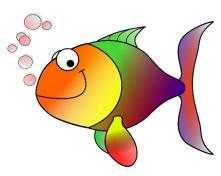
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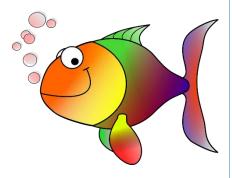
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
